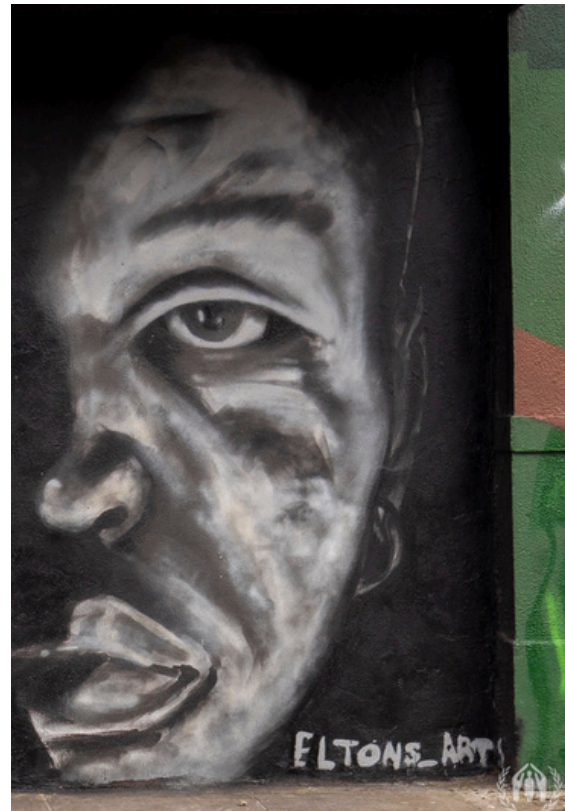

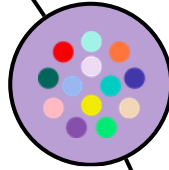

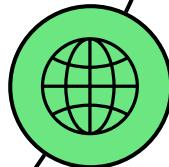

About Refugee Week

Refugee Week is the world's largest arts & culture festival celebrating the contributions, creativity and resilience of people seeking sanctuary.

Refugee Week brings people from different backgrounds to connect beyond labels, as well as foster a deeper understanding of why people are displaced, and the challenges people face when seeking sanctuary.

When and where does it happen?

This is Ireland's fourth year taking part.

It's been running in the UK since 1998 and is always the week around World Refugee Day (20 June). This year it will be 15-21st of June 2026.

It is an umbrella festival with activities happening everywhere. There are events taking place all across the world including Ireland as well as many new international festivals.

Can I take part?

Refugee Week is for everyone. Everyone can get involved whether you have 5 months, 5 weeks or 5 minutes.

Background

Our Vision?

The vision of Refugee Week is for refugees and asylum seekers to live safely within inclusive and resilient communities, where they can continue to make a valuable contribution.

Refugee Week activities work towards this vision by helping to bring about more informed and welcoming attitudes towards refugees and asylum seekers.

Refugee Week is an umbrella festival, and anyone can get involved by holding or joining an event or activity that is aligned with Refugee Week's shared values & principles. You can read more about Refugee Week's vision and aims by exploring our [Theory of Change](#).

Who We Are?

Refugee Week Ireland is coordinated through a steering committee. Members include UNHCR Ireland, Irish Refugee Council, Irish Red Cross, Doras, Nasc, Jesuit Refugee Service, Sanctuary Runners, Dignity Partnership and the Ukraine Civil Society Forum.

The Irish Steering Committee works with Counterpoints Arts UK to bring Refugee Week to life.

Do I need to ask for permission to take part?

No, that's the brilliant thing about Refugee Week. Because it's an umbrella festival everyone can take part. We just ask that everyone taking part be aligned with our vision and values which are:

We All Have the Right to be Safe:
Everyone deserves a home

Refugees are not a Single Group:
We recognise the different barriers and experiences people face

There is a Bigger Us:
We are interconnected. The safety of each of us matters to all of us

Celebrating Contributions:
Everyone has something to give, no-one has anything to prove

Reclaiming 'Refugee':
We use the term positively, and respect people's right to self-define

Open to All:
Our events are welcoming and inclusive

Leadership Matters:
Supporting lived experience leadership

Arts and Culture Make Change:
Creativity helps us see things differently

A Space for Many Stories:
No single narrative represents 'the refugee experience'

Everyone is invited to hold their own Refugee Week event, from food events, to sport matches to film screenings and music festivals- events of all shapes & sizes are welcome!

By supporting local you can get involved with what is happening on your doorstep and make connections in your local community.

3 Hold an Event

Things to consider when planning your event (continued)

Safety + Wellbeing:

How can you help protect people in vulnerable situations and ensure wellbeing? You might start by preparing a friendly code of conduct for your event, or do a simple 'safeguarding risk assessment'. For online events, it's safest not to share Zoom publicly, and to disable the share screen.

If personal stories are being shared, how can this be done in a safe and empowering way?

IDEAS TO TAKE PART

LIBRARIES

By telling personal stories books can help us understand the human impact of displacement.

- Take part in Simple Acts - Read & Listen
- Use and promote the Children's Books Ireland curated list of refugee specific books in your location.
- Host a book club or a reading circle
- Host a community film screening & discussion

RETAIL

High streets are integral parts of our local communities. They are crucial to fostering a sense of connection and belonging.

- Create a Refugee Week display
- Highlight refugee-made products –
- Build a "Community as a Superpower" Wall – Invite customers to share messages of support.
- Host a workshop e.g. crafting, cooking, or art sessions.

FOOD AND HOSPITALITY

Spaces like cafés and restaurants, bring people together through food, conversation, and culture.

- Take part in share a meal
- Curate a Refugee Week menu
- Display your solidarity
- Collaborate with refugee chefs
- Host a supper club
- Organise a Coffee & Books event
- Exhibit artwork – Share stories of community, migration, and belonging.

SPORTS CLUBS

Sports are vital to well-being and community, fostering connection and belonging.

- Organise a Community Sports Day
- Partner with a local refugee group and design a sport programme with them.
- Provide access to sports facilities or activities for refugees.
- Highlight stories of refugee athletes or teams.
